Judges will grade entries on:

Adherence to correct English grammar, syntax, and punctuation Effective and clear essay structure Quality and originality of work

*Remember: All resources must be clearly and appropriately cited using a MLA conventions including a works cited page

Allegory: a story, play, poem, picture, or other work in which the characters and events represent particular qualities or ideas that relate to morals, religion, or politics.

The Cambridge English Dictionary definition encapsulates the importance of allegory as a device authors and artists call upon to look critically at the nuances of the human experience. Plato's Allegory of the Cave, William Golding's Lord of the Flies, and Leslie Marmon Silko's Ceremony are common literary examples of an author's masterful use of allegory to add profound depth to their intents for their respective stories.

Allegory can also be found in other works of art beyond literature. Consider Daniel Chester French's statue of Abraham Lincoln at The Lincoln Memorial in Washington, DC. Its political allegory defines a nation at war with itself, using the embattled president's portrayal in the sculpture to symbolize an embattled country. Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 7 is considered an unconventional psychological allegory of the human psyche, portraying a journey of the emotions that come with both struggle and hope, particularly in the second movement's allegretto.

Conduct your own investigation into the artist's use of allegory to convey a message in either French's Lincoln sculpture or the movements in Beethoven's symphony (see below,)
